It is hard to reconcile our colonization of a land via the Doctrine of Discovery, to a land that was already occupied with many more people than the history books wanted us to believe but the evidence was in an early map. Our Lecture journey then led us to cycling the paths of Kamloops. Now we can reflect on our alternatives to our driving habits for the sake of the

earth. Another message was of how our journey of life is a collective endeavour, not to be endured alone. The importance of water both in survival but also in the beauty of symbolism, for example baptism, has been evident in our history. We explored the importance of listening to our "inner voice" in navigating our lives. The "All My Relations" stories demonstrated how interdependent all of God's creatures are on this earth. The importance of learning from our indigenous people was highlighted.

Soup Ministry

The Soup Ministry has been in slow decline since the start of the pandemic. In 2021 we handed out soup and frozen baked goods to 148 people. That is a decrease of 381 from 2019.

There are many reasons for this shift and they are all good for the community we serve! During the pandemic new food security sources arrived on the scene including the COVID meal train. This was a blessing to the lower income people that we support. There has also been significant increases to affordable housing projects being built but they have mainly been on the North Shore so we are seeing less foot traffic on a day to day basis.

We have a lovely lady – Loreen – who is not a parishioner, but bakes cookies for handing out. We have people who come by just for the cookies because they are just that good! We are very thankful for our home soup makers for providing soup over the pandemic as the soup troop has not been able to meet. When life opens up again we will meet and make pots of soup and have some laughs!

St. Paul's Cathedral - People's Warden Report

Greetings!

My first year as People's Warden has been a very interesting and a challenging year due to COVID-19 and the Omicron variant. It has required some changes in service procedures, meetings, etc.

With Jon Buckle's assistance and vast knowledge, I believe we have kept things running as best as possible.

Cathedral Committee has been on line via zoom as has the Administration & Finance Committee.

Jon Buckle will be stepping down as Rector's Warden and I would like to say thank you to Jon for his contribution to St. Paul's Cathedral over the past 4 years. I will miss working with you, but you have earned a well-deserved rest.
